Parent Progress Chats

Just a reminder about our "learning map" parents' meetings: When it is your child's turn to receive a learning map you will be notified by their key person. Please inform us at this time of the sorts of activities that your child particularly enjoys. We would also be grateful if you could take some photos of your child out of school as they take part in any activities they enjoy with family and friends, these will be added to their learning journey folders which you will get to keep when they leave The Lawns.

The learning map will contain notes and photos of your child's learning and development for that week and it will form a starting point for a discussion between yourselves and the key person. Together we will agree on possible next steps for your child and the ways in which we could support them together.

We hope you find these updates informative and enjoy sharing them with us as much as we enjoy creating them. The whole process enables us to get to know your child better and plan for them as an individual.



How to Support Your Child's Learning at Home

We are often asked by parents for advice on how to support their child's learning at home. Some more ways in which learning can be supported on an on-going basis include:

- Sharing stories and books at any opportunity.
- Encouraging your child to make up stories using their small world play figures or by telling stories together. Write the stories down for your child and read them back to them. You could try taking photographs of the small world play to illustrate the story.



- Continue to develop your child's interest in writing by encouraging them to mark make with different writing equipment. Try using unusual materials on a tray such as value shaving foam, a corn flour and water mixture with a little food colouring in, lentils, rice, in fact anything that they can leave a mark in.
- Notice with your child quantities of 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 objects, such as when peeling a satsuma or looking at picture books. Model the language e.g. "I can see three cats, two here and one there, that's three altogether."

These suggested activities would fit in well with the things we are doing in Nursery:

© Encourage your child to recognise their coat and attempt to put it on independently,. This will help them to develop their self help skills at Nursery.



- © Go to the library or borrow a book from Nursery to share at home. Point out the title of the book to your child, the name of the author and illustrator and look carefully at the pictures. Encourage your child to tell you the story from the pictures. Talk about the character's feelings and what might happen next before you turn each page.
- © Remember to look at the weekly updates that provide other ideas for supporting your child's learning at home. Our book recommendation of the month is Owl Babies by Martin Waddell. It is a comforting read for children worried about their parents leaving them alone. Sarah, Percy and Bill the baby owls wake one night to find their mother gone. Their plight is sensitively told and helps children to talk about and work through their own feelings.
